Diploma in Urgent Medical Care 16 - 17 January 2018 | Fee: £800

Closing date 27 October 2017

The Faculty of Pre-Hospital Care are proud to announce a major new development with the launch of the Diploma in Urgent Medical Care. This examination will be of particular interest to those providing urgent care and looking for professional development opportunities.

Examination Aims

The exam is designed to test the knowledge, skills and behaviours of multi-disciplinary urgent medical care practitioners.

The level of performance expected is that commensurate with level 7 practitioners within the Skills for Health Career Framework for Health (www.skillsforhealth.org.uk). The focus of this exam is the timely recognition, diagnosis and management of conditions and situations in the urgent care environment (GP, OOH, Walk in Centre) rather than on the use of facilities for investigation and treatment that may be available predominantly within an acute hospital. This exam includes urgent care for all patient age groups from neonates to the very elderly.

Over the past year, the Regional Representatives Group has reviewed its Terms of Reference and worked hard to develop ideas that may improve existing and encourage the development of new groups.

A regional group may be able to do some of the following:



- 1. Contribute to co-ordination and promotion of educational events in their area.
- 2. Actively share information with FPHC to enable update of regional web pages.
- 3. Promote other resources on the FPHC website, for example exams and Faculty accreditation.
- 4. Engage with relevant practitioners and groups in the region, for example:
- Links with universities such as representing FPHC at university open days.
- Participation in undergraduate teaching opportunities and link with undergraduate schemes
- Engaging with regional Major Trauma Networks and sharing educational meeting details via the web page.
- Encouraging PHEM trainees, especially at completion of their training programmes, to contribute to the regional groups, and making contact via the Training Programme Directors to welcome any new PHEM trainees to the region.
- Events teams and voluntary aid groups and organisations such as RNLI and Mountain Rescue Teams.
- Ensuring close links with local operational BASICS schemes.
